Subco Exhibition

"How come we didn't know about NHS Subcos?"

The idea of NHS Trusts setting up wholly owned subsidiary

companies is about as far from Bevan's NHS as you can get.

We are through the looking glass and into a world where patients have become "customers" and healthcare is viewed through the lens of commercial enterprise rather than as a public good and the responsibility of the state. Strip away the presented veneer of cost-saving - achieved through cutting staff salaries and pensions and reclaiming VAT in a move akin to tax evasion - and the true motive for creating SubCos is clearly revealed as the transfer of assets out of the NHS. This has already happened to the tune of tens of millions of pounds and is likely to accelerate since NHS England CEO Jim Mackay said earlier this year that all Trusts should set up SubCos to save costs - an outright lie since setting up SubCos is costly for the Trust and anticipated VAT changes will make this even more so. The NHS pays and it is its patients and staff who suffer. SHA at the 1st Right to Food Conference Sat. 13 Sept 9AM-5PM



"Food insecurity, malnutrition and hunger continue to increase as a result of further cuts to welfare and poverty pay. Our food system is broken. This national conference will discuss a new strategy from farm to fork that stands by the rights of farmers, food growers, and all food and nutrition workers. A plan that gives us more control over which foods are sold on our high streets and the price of healthy foods. Our families and communities must have the right to live healthy lives with dignity. Ian Byrne MP's Right To Food campaign provides a strategy for changing the food system based on enshrining the right to food in law. This starts with living wages and benefits to afford healthy and culturally chosen foods. In the UK, a healthy diet would cost up to 70% of disposable income for families with children. People with disabilities are most vulnerable, with over 50% struggling financially already and some now facing cuts to their disability benefits."

Support pathology workers on strike!

Health Services Laboratory - The Doctors' Laboratory "Staff at the HSL laboratories who conduct blood, skin, and tissue tests for two London healthcare trusts are furious over the lack of transparency in their grading. This means staff are often doing the work of more senior colleagues without being properly paid or doing the same job as other colleagues and being paid different rates. The privatised service, despite being a supplier to the NHS, does not adhere to NHS pay scales and staff earn less money than if they were directly employed by the NHS" - Unite the Union - read more, here.

Notice circulated: "HUGE pathology workers strike next week* Mose than 800 outsourced pathology workers in north London will be ON STRIKE over pay and unsafe staffing levels with Unite next week! The walkout by workers at Health Services Laboratory is set to cause widespread disruption to the NHS. Workers pay has eroded since they were outsourced from the NHS. Meanwhile the CEO of HSL gave himself a 40% pay rise last year. Support frontline healthcare workers on their picket lines! Resident Doctor Strikes

"Sign of wider conflicts to come" Andy Ford, Unite NHS Rep. Vote to strike - "massive 90% on a 53% turnout". "Nearly half a million NHS staff are currently employed in these two pay bands alone. Many of them are leaving to earn the same or better pay in supermarkets or routine admin jobs where they do not face the constant pressure of clinical work.

In a further twist, new visa rules introduced, in a misguided response to Reform's electoral successes, have ensured that NHS Band 3 falls £67 a year short of eligibility for overseas workers to be supported into the NHS. Because of that £67 a year, and the erosion of the NHS pay scales, huge holes are going to open up in NHS staffing, with dire effects on patient care. No amount of right-wing rhetoric will fill those holes.

The trade union movement should demand:

Resident doctors be paid fairly
The government should agree a road map towards
pay restoration for all NHS staff
A restoration of the nursing bursary
An end to pandering to the illusory politics of racism."

Cumbria - Professor Allyson Pollock

Professor Pollock visited Carlisle and was welcomed by a full meeting to discuss her published research about the creation of a two-tier system within the NHS, how outsourcing fuels inequalities and drives up waiting times. Attendees were keen to ask Professor Pollock about her recent research and her previous work specifically on PFI as Cumbria branch has an ongoing campaign. Cumberland Infirmary was the first hospital to be bond financed and the PFI hospital has already cost taxpayers £260M (2015). It is anticipated the cost will total upwards of £1018M (by 2036). The hospital was built without fire-safety doors, minus 90 hospital beds, and a flooded operating room - all before it was even opened. Cumbria's leaflet can be viewed, here. Motion - "Stop Starving Gaza"

Model / template motion passed by SHA London

"This branch notes over 60,000 Palestinians have been killed in Gaza since October 2023. 70% are women and children. The Israeli government's blockade of food and humanitarian aid is causing widespread starvation to a population already displaced, traumatised and under constant bombardment. The health sector has been targeted and decimated, along with all public health infrastructure. – Over 1000 Palestinian civilians have been killed seeking food from private aid hubs, in what the UN has described as the "weaponization of food" and a war crime." NHS Structure, Policy, Privatisation

MMT Meeting, 31st July

Last month, SHA members were invited to hear from guest speaker Patricia Pino Argumedo, PhD candidate at the Institute for Innovation and Public Purpose on Public Finance and 'Modern Monetary Theory' (MMT). The meeting was well attended and thoroughly informative - Patricia offered an analysis of the theories surrounding NHS affordability and the funding of healthcare services - particularly in regards to the proposed PFI copayments, and constraints placed on healthcare when viewed from a 'tax before spending' cycle standpoint. Patricia noted this cycle standpoint was most often used by those looking to profiteer off of the privatisation of the NHS. Richard Murphy, Professor and co-founder of the Tax Justice Network (2024) details this cycle within his work and argues this cycle standpoint obscures the reality of taxation, and lends to the misrepresentation that the NHS is simply 'not affordable'. Public services, Patricia argued, are not directly funded through taxation. Rather, tax is a control for inequality and inflation, and acts as a 'steering wheel' for the economy. While taxation is still important, public finance should be thought of in a 'spending comes first' cycle standpoint, where funds are invested to directly achieve government objectives and manage growth - debt is not a burden but rather a national savings product, an asset.


"The question [then] is no longer "can we afford it?" but is, instead, "do we have the resources, skills, and technology to do it?" If the answer is yes, then, as John Mastnard Keynes once noted, whatever it is we want can be done. The government can create the money, direct the work, and use taxation afterwards to keep the economy balanced, and that opens the door to a completely different policy agenda for younger people..." (Murphy, 2025).

From this cycle standpoint, Patricia elaborated, growth is fostered, supported and arguments about the NHS being 'unaffordable' collapse. Murphy (2025) goes on to reason that while there is a need for more certain forms of taxation - again to help address inequality and control inflation - the types of taxation need to be further addressed.

Capital gains and taxes on income derived from wealth should be equalised with forms of income taxation, and often income in the form of dividends is "severely undertaxed". Murphy (2024) 'Taxing Wealth Report' details an "enormous horizontal inequity within the UK tax system", offering further insight and proposed reforms to address staggering inequalities.
